



CONSENT FOR MRI CONTRAST AGENT INJECTION

A drug, (contrast agent), has been developed to make more clear MRI pictures of the part of the body that is to be examined. This drug will be injected into your vein.

In a very small percentage of patients, there are mild adverse reactions. Rarely, headaches or nausea are noted following contrast administration.

In a smaller percentage of cases there may be more severe complications. These problems are usually recognized promptly and treated without difficulty.

If you have any questions regarding this procedure or the possible risks, please inform the technologist. Although the reactions mentioned above seldom occur, we believe it to be in your best interest to understand what is involved.
